Lucky escape at the mouth

A man and his 17 year old son were rescued by local fishermen after their 14ft boat turned over coming back through the mouth of the Nornalup Inlet on Sunday. The Sea Rescue crew then went out in *Harlequin* to salvage the boat and tow it back to the jetty.

Constable Andrew Curtis of Walpole Police Station said the two were not wearing life jackets and were lucky that the accident was seen by other people and they were quickly taken from the water. "Life jackets should be worn at all times," Const. Curtis said.

Plans to protect water quality, but no early supply solution

The protection plan for Walpole's water supply catchment area has been published – with no good news for a short-term solution to the town's water supply problems.

Instead the Department of Water's report says it will be at least seven or eight years before alternative or enlarged water sources are available.

Presumably this means they could be carting water into Walpole again in summer, and possibly for the next eight summers.

As the report points out, having no alternative water supply makes it important to protect the quality of what is available.

To do this the report proposes that all the crown land and a small area of private land in the catchment area be declared Priority 1, which means areas where steps are taken to avoid risks to water quality.

All other land would be Priority 2, which recognises risks exist but seeks to manage them.

All round the boundaries of the 50 square kilometre catchment area there will be signs alerting people to the need to preserve water quality.

All proposals for development will have to be referred to the Department of Water and the Department of Environment and Conservation's plans for the Walpole Wilderness Area will have to reflect its recommendations.

In the Priority 1 areas there will be no swimming, no fishing and no marroning. Although the DEC proposes some of the area will be zoned for activities including firewood collection, the Department of Water will urge the establishment of areas outside the catchment area for this purpose.

It will also urge that any future recreational areas be established outside the catchment, and that the existing Swarbrick Discovery Centre be carefully managed and monitored for its impact on water quality.

The DEC airstrip will remain in the catchment area, but any expansion of it will be opposed.

Negotiations are already taking place to protect and possibly purchase the privately-owned land in the Priority 1 area. This is a small area of water-logged land close to the weir.

In the Priority 2 area the report says the Department of Water will work with landowners to manage water quality, including helping with applications for funding if needed.

Guidelines are being developed which the Department says are "a practical commonsense approach to environmental issues and are not intended to result in any unreasonable burden to industry." These will include suggestions for improvements to dams, fencing waterways, relocating stock watering points and upgrading sewerage systems.

An assessment will be made of all Shire and DEC roads in the area, including the adequacy or run-offs, maintenance practices and transport of fuel or chemicals.

A proposal that a creek running under North Walpole Road should be redirected is not supported, as it supplies much-needed water into the system. Instead, the catchment area has been enlarged to cover the land along the creek.

The Waste Transfer Station is within the proposed Priority 2 area. The report says current sampling indicates water quality meets acceptable levels, but calls for a management plan for future activity at the site.

Obstetrician to service southern region



Albany Hospital's new full-time gynaecologist/obstetrician, Dr Johan Herholdt, visited Denmark last week to meet medical staff from the Denmark Hospital and Walpole's Silver Chain centre.

Dr Herholdt was appointed by the State Government to meet a long-felt need for additional specialist services in the Great Southern.

He will not be an alternative to existing general practitioners who provide gynaecological and obstretical services but will provide them with additional back-up and advisory services to those currently available from a Perth based specialist who visits the town.

He will also be available to advise midwives and nurses at Denmark and Walpole.

A South African with more than 30 years experience, Dr Herholdt was in private practice in Ireland before being recruited by the Health Department, which has been looking for a full-time gynaecologist/obstetrician for Albany for almost ten years.

He has been employed on a five-year contract.

While really difficult births will still require transfer to Perth, where specialist equipment and facilities are available, Dr Herholdt's presence is expected to reduce the number of transfers considerably.

It will also reduce the time women have to wait for gynaecological procedures in Albany, where almost 400 such cases are treated each year.

Dr Herholdt will also conduct a review of gynaecological and obstretical services available locally and make recommendations for improvements.

Announcing the appointment, the Minister for Health, Jim McGinty, said Dr Herholdt would hold three consultation clinics each week and perform operations on up to 60 patients referred to the clinic by local doctors each week.

He said Dr Herholdt would develop gynaecology and obstretic services for the wider Great Southern region.

Dr Sharon Jackson, Silver Chain nurse Penney Murphy and Denmark midwives Fran Gratwick and Jill Rule with Dr Herholdt.

"This will involve establishing an outreach program for gynaecology patients in rural areas, and exploring the possibility of developing a rural high-risk antenatal referral service using video and telephone conferencing," Mr McGinty said.

"In the coming months regular clinics will be established in regional centres across the Great Southern."

Beautiful Kuching

The previous cemetery is, today, a beautiful garden with flowers, large trees, wooden pavilions and a Victorian aquarium.

The local specialty Sarawak Laksa is served at many open air eateries which can be found at the top or bottom of car parks. The freshest seafood is served at Top Spot Food Court.

Kuching is a paradise of ethnic handicrafts. Galleries and shops follow each other long Jalan Main Bazaar. The Iban are famous for their ikan (fish) as well as baskets and rattan objects. Orang Ulu for their intricate wooden sculptures and more recent galleries mix traditional motives and contemporary designs. Other popular souvenirs include pottery, exotic plants and pepper.

Forty minutes from the capital visitors can enjoy the fine beaches of luxurious resorts in Damai, play golf, trek in the rainforest or visit the Sarawak Cultural Village, an open-air museum that recreates the Sarawakian ethnic way of life.

Orang utan lovers should not miss the Semengoh Rehabilitation Centre. Located 80 minutes from Kuching, Bako National Park is an excellent introduction to the wildlife and flora of the rainforest of Sarawak.

Politicians praise power forum

The two politicians who attended the Power To The People forum in Walpole last week have both praised the tone of the forum and the direction the community is taking.

Stirling MLA Terry Redman, said the forum had provided a much needed opportunity for residents to come together to voice their concerns and their suggestions.

“Walpole’s current and future power requirements have been a significant issue for many months and there has been a great deal of conjecture about what the alternatives for power sustainability might be and how they could be practically implemented,” Terry said.

“The “Power to the People” forum has enabled all of those opinions to be aired and debated.

“It was evident from discussions at the forum, that the community has embraced the concept of energy that is viable both from an environmental and a financial stand point.

“There are numerous practical considerations that will need to be overcome, however I am optimistic that Walpole’s unique environmental status will give us a head start towards achieving that goal.” Greens MLC Paul Llewellyn said the forum showed the local community welcomed a vision for a new localized power plan to resolve the power crisis.

“The Greens are proposing a modern, renewable power generation solution, including wind-diesel and solar power linked to energy-smart homes and businesses, that will guarantee a reliable, clean and safe energy supply for Walpole,” said Mr Llewellyn.

“If we want long-term solutions to power security for rural communities such as Walpole and Denmark, we need to

re-localise our power generation and delivery,” he said.

“The expensive, centralised system has now become overtaxed and rural communities on the end of the line are suffering regular black outs and poor quality power that impacts homes and businesses.

“Western Power is offering multi-million dollar upgrades to existing transmission lines, but people are ready for a change, and they want the money spent on renewable technologies and innovative energy saving strategies including the use of smart meters.

“Walpole and Denmark are in the perfect situation to model this new comprehensive, eco- friendly approach to energy security.”

Tingle tree project brings other benefits

The History Society's project to collect pictures of cars and people inside the old hollow tingle trees has produced much more than was anticipated.

Among those who have sent in photographs are several people who have past connections with Walpole.

One treasure trove came from Bobbie Halliday, whose mother was Em Ebbett, one of the original Ebbetts who came out from Cornwall on the "Demosthenes" in 1925.

Em was then 9 years old and her brother George was 11. They came with their mother, Ellen, whose brother Will Ould, had a farm at Tingledale.

Em married Charles Mutzig, a teacher at the Tingledale School, and George married Barbara, who still lives here.

Bobbie sent the society a number of photographs she inherited from her mother including the Tingledale School in 1936, a group of children taught by Charles Mutzig there at that time, and a car owned by another teacher, Eric Lofthouse, who was at Hazelvale School, inside one of the tingle trees in 1934.

Another who has sent in a photograph is Margaret Collett, now living in Rockingham, who wrote that she was one of the original members of the history society and sent her best wishes to anyone who still

remembered her. Her picture, taken with a Box Brownie camera, was taken on her honeymoon in 1963.

How to protect yourself against influenza this winter

Influenza is a highly contagious disease that can be spread through coughing or sneezing. It is caused by a virus and is not the same as a cold.

Sometimes we confuse the flu for a cold but there is an important difference between them. A cold may still leave you feeling lousy but influenza is more serious, because of its debilitating symptoms which can last for several weeks, as well as the risk of developing complications (such as pneumonia) Influenza spreads easily in droplets of moisture.

Just being around someone who is coughing or sneezing is enough to contract influenza. A person can be contagious before their symptoms become evident which adds to the spread of the disease.

How do we prevent getting the flu?

Vaccination against the flu. Vaccination is an injection of a small amount of the virus, but this is not a live virus and cannot cause influenza. Wash your hands regularly and cover your mouth when coughing or sneezing. Try to cough or sneeze into a tissue and dispose of the tissue immediately. Don't forget to wash your hands! If you have the flu make sure you also avoid physical contact with others, avoid social gatherings while contagious and don't return to work early, you could still be contagious.

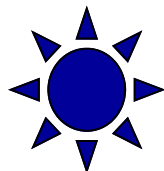

Market Value: What's That ?

The purchase of real estate usually has two key components; one is emotional, the other financial.

Most home buyers (as opposed to investors) want to feel a strong attraction to the property they purchase. After all, they are going to live in it. But they also have to make the right investment decision because their enjoyment of the property can be spoiled if, further down the track when they go to re-sell, they realise they paid too much or made a poor investment.

The key to both financial and emotional success is doing your homework thoroughly before you purchase.

You can speed up the research process by making sure you look at all the properties that satisfy your basic criteria, including those that don't sound like your ideal home.

Even properties that don't appeal are relevant for building up a portfolio and getting a handle on price trends.

Many intending purchasers turn down the opportunity of inspecting properties in their price range simply because they 'don't appeal'.

But the more properties you see in your price range in a short space of time, the sooner you will be ready to buy. And you're less likely to end up seeing your dream home early in the piece and feeling you're not ready to make an offer.

I would advise purchasers to take a notebook with them and jot down their comments for later comparison.

Use every available information source. Make sure you follow up all the houses you have inspected. Did they sell quickly and if so how much for?

Most professional agents will provide information about recent sales.

Remember you need to look at a lot of properties to feel confident you have a trend or a pattern emerging. If you know what ten or twelve properties have actually sold for within a ten thousand dollar range of your budget, you're probably ready to walk into a house and say I like this one, and I'm prepared to pay x dollars for it.

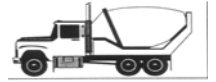

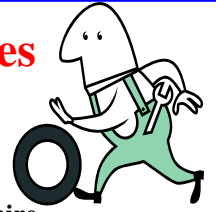

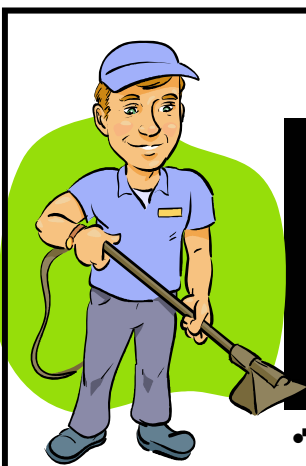
